CHRIST EPISCOPAL CHURCH



The original church building, begun in 1805, was a plain fieldstone structure. In 1875 the building was completely remodeled in the ecclesiastical Gothic Revival style. The church of today is essentially the 1875 model. Over the years, changes have been made to the original structure-including the addition of a bell tower and steeple in the early years of the twentieth century-bringing the church to its present, charming appearance. In 2005 the church celebrated it's 200 anniversary and continues to grow and thrive. Located across from Kleins on Rt. 24 in Forest Hill, the location has very easy access.

Please wear flat shoes. No photographs, camera phones or children under 10. Please turn cell phones off.

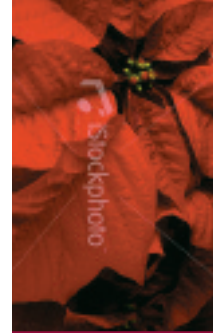

DIRECTIONS

WILSON HOME / 2410 ROCKS ROAD / FOREST HILL

From Bel Air, drive on Route 24 North, which becomes Rock Spring Road, for approximately 2.4 miles into Forest Hill. House is on the left, across the street from Centre United Methodist Church.

NILES HOME / 205 KINGS CROSSING COURT / BUILDING 205 / CONDO 3A / BEL AIR

From Bel Air, travel Route 1 North to Kings Crossing condominium development off of Hickory Avenue; building 205 is the last building on the right. Enter the first door and press the bell for 3A and someone will buzz you in. Park in a non-numbered spot.

SCHRUEFER HOME / 1617 CRESTON DRIVE / FOREST HILL

From Bel Air, travel to Route 24 North (becomes Rock Spring Road/Route 24) approximately 1.7 miles. Turn left on Route 23 to left on High Point Road (about 1 mile). Bear right on Pleasantville Road to left on Campbell Road. Creston Drive is on the right.

ARNOLD HOME / 105 GLENWOOD ROAD / BEL AIR

Route 924 South from Bel Air, turn left on Glenwood Road, 105 Glenwood Road is on the right.

WAGNER HOME / 1603 ROLLING ROAD / BEL AIR

From directions above, continue on Glenwood Road, taking a right on to Rolling Road. The house is on the left, just after you pass Duncannon on your right.

WICKENDEN HOME /

1808 BARRINGTON VILLAGE COURT / BEL AIR

Turn into stone entrance to Barrington Place (between Lake Drive and the McDonald's) off of Route 924, which is also Emmorton Road. Turn left on Barrington Village Court; 1808 is in the middle of the second group of homes on the right.

THE WILSON HOME



Carolyn and Larry Wilson are sharing their recently restored three-storied home. The home was originally built in 1914 by Abel D. Wilson, the great-grandfather of the current owner. Abel D. Wilson played a vital part in bringing the railroad to

Forest Hill when it opened in 1883. He gave the Ma and Pa Railroad the right-a-way to go through his farm to transport goods and travelers between York, PA and Baltimore. Carolyn and Larry Wilson moved into the home two years ago after spending the two previous years restoring the home back to much of its finest glory. The research and detail can be seen today as you tour the three floors of the home. Antiques fill the home, as many of them have stayed with the home for generations. The dining table is set with Larry's grandmother's china and silver. The children's tea set displayed in a third-level bedroom was found covered with dirt out in the carriage house. The family Christmas tree decorations have taken several lifetimes to collect, each with its own unique story to share.

THE NILES HOME



This top-floor condo with its cathedral ceilings makes a spacious home for Joan Niles. Joan is sharing many of her special collections with us today. Her "Snow Baby" collection can be found on the mantel of the inviting fireplace. Look for the
